

# LAW, RELIGION, AND YOUTH IN AFRICA 13<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference Kigali, Rwanda May 17<sup>th</sup> – 20<sup>th</sup>, 2026

## **Call for Papers**

The seeming inability of many African countries to overcome their vicious cycles of paralyzing political and economic woes has ironically elicited streams of creative energies from African youth across the continent. The recent waves of youth-led activism against multiple symptoms and effects of misgovernance indicate a collective search by young Africans for meaningful ways to navigate, challenge, and/or reshape existing systems. Their complaints address the protean forms of disabling and oppressive constraints to which they are often subjected. These stem from mainstream development paradigms that often overlook the lived realities, capacities, and aspirations of African youth. Nor should it be forgotten that more than a third of the world's young people will live in Africa by 2050.

The African Union expresses its desire to address these challenges in its **Agenda 2063** where it seeks, among other things, to empower Africa's youth socially, economically, and politically; mainstream youth issues in all developmental agendas by eliminating all forms systemic inequalities, exploitation, marginalization and discrimination of young people; and guaranteeing Africa's youth full access to education, training, skills and technology, health services, jobs and economic opportunities, recreational and cultural activities as well as financial means and all necessary resources to allow them to realize their full potential.

Thus, the ACLARS 2026 conference will focus on the intersection of youth agency, dignity, peace, security, and development in Africa, especially as it relates to law, religion, and transformative innovation, including entrepreneurship. Despite the centrality of religion in many African contexts, it hardly features in official development agendas. Yet, recent scholarships have shown the mutually reinforcing relevance of faith-based and rights-based approaches to the pursuit of justice, dignity, and sustainable peace and development. Furthermore, varied African religious traditions can be mined as ethical and practical resources for addressing poverty, inequality, and exclusion, especially if integrated with legal and innovative strategies being championed by the youth.

Accordingly, we encourage contributions that critically engage with how young Africans are asserting their agency and dignity within legal frameworks, religious contexts, and through innovative practices that aim for social transformation.

#### **INSTRUCTIONS FOR ACLARS PAPER SUBMISSIONS**

In sum, we seek papers that examine critically the nexus of LAW, RELIGION, and YOUTH in the AFRICAN CONTEXT, pertaining to questions of religious freedom, power, authority, hierarchy, and agency. *Proposals will be evaluated on their analytical clarity, empirical evidence, comparative value, and relevance to the conference theme.* 

#### Submission instructions

In addition to the above-suggested topics, ACLARS is willing to accept contributions relevant to the field of law and religion from all interested persons for the 2026 Conference. Priority will, however, be given to proposals that are relevant to the overall theme of the conference. It is imperative that these contributions be in the African context.

Abstracts (not exceeding 250 words) should be submitted by **30 September 2025**. To be considered, abstracts and author information must be submitted using the online process:
